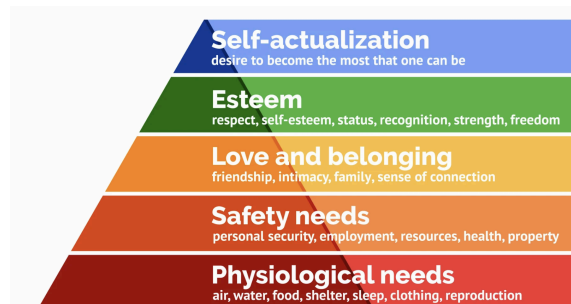

Fall Advising & Registration

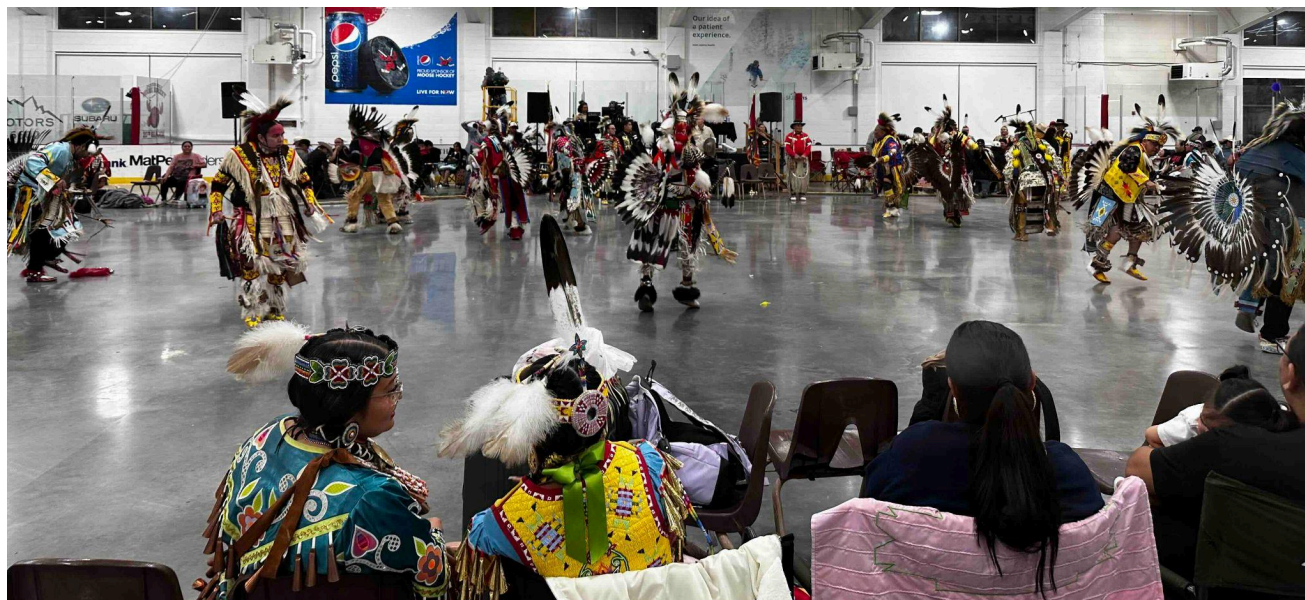

Native Voices & 5th Annual Teton Powwow



Thank you to everyone who supported, participated and enjoyed the series of events during the Native Voices celebration and 5th Annual Teton Powwow. Inspired by Ivan Posey, the event organizing committee offered an expanded celebration this year - entitled Native Voices: Honoring Indigenous Ways - introducing educational programs in addition to the successful and growing Teton Powwow. In total, the celebrations reached the community in diverse and meaningful ways, from small intimate events of 30 to 40 attendees, film screenings with 60 to 80 attendees, and a record 437 Powwow competitors, plus over two thousand dancer family members and spectators.

Over five days, the team hosted a number of community outreach events and integrated classroom engagement with CWC students (culinary, hospitality, film, and American Indian Studies) and students at Arapahoe, Fort Washakie, Jackson Hole, and Wyoming Indian high schools).



Educational topics ranged from Native participation in outdoor recreation, conservation and land reclamation, Indigenous foods, Native narratives in filmmaking, and the healing powers of star quilt making.

New for this year, highlights included creating a pathway between Teton and Fremont counties. Three event presenters participated in events on the Wind River Reservation and CWC Riverton, providing quality educational and programmatic opportunities for Native youth and community members. A special shout out to Al Hubbard, Eric Bennett, and Rory Tendore for making these opportunities possible and for faculty members Ben Evans, Jeremy Nielsen, and

Andrew Siegel for welcoming the programming into their classrooms.



The 2026 Native Voices and 6th Annual Teton Powwow is scheduled for the week of May 4th to 10th. We look forward to sharing more event info in the months to come!
